

The Second Coming of Christ

Steps Toward the Attaining of the Consciousness Which was in Christ Jesus

Judge not, that ye be not judged. For with what judgment ye judge, ye shall be judged: and with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again. And why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but considerest not the beam that is in thine own eye? Or how wilt thou say to thy brother, let me pull out the mote out of thine eye; and, behold, a beam is in thine own eye.

"T UDGE JDGE not, that ye be not judged," does not mean that if you overlook the crimes of other people that your criminal activities will be overlooked. It is contrary to human legal law for one to conceal knowledge of the criminal activities of others, such as robbing or murdering. You are held liable for helping criminals to evade punishment.

Jesus refers here mostly to sex immorality, which is due to bad pre-natal or post-natal habits, or to bad company. There is a compulsion of the physical sex force by which people are led astray. However, because some persons habitually have no sex desire, that does an innocent person or a slightly im-

not make them saints, for they may have a very wicked, insincere heart. Some individuals struggle day and night against the sex compulsion due to evil heredity, to bad karma of past lives, or to adhesions or congestion in the sex region. Such sufferers should consult a physician and should practice the technique given by a Guru-Preceptor in order to get rid of this abnormal sex craving.

A man who can match his will power against sex compulsion and win, and who can convince the mind that the peace of self-control is greater than sex indulgence, is a greater man than the one who is good because he doesn't have any sex desire to overcome. A man who is innocent because of lack of experience may succumb to temptation whenever it first comes to him. Of all evils, beware of the habit of remaining on the sex plane in thought or action, for it is one of the most difficult sense desires to be controlled, regulated, and subjugated.

Therefore, if you are suffering from immorality, you have no right to judge other immoral people. To judge does not signify that you should not warn

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moral individual of the dangers of forming bad habits. If you judge others only to help them or to correct them without hurting them by exposure, or gossip, or scolding, or taunting, then such judgment is all right.

Judging is of different kinds. "For with what judgment ye judge, ye shall be judged." "What judgment" signifies judging people in order to audaciously hurt them or bring them to ridicule. Even to punish evil people quietly in such a way that they will try to reform themselves, is all right. The court judge punishes criminals for the sake of all society, as well as for their own good, so that they will not perform greater and greater crimes. But, to punish people just to satisfy wrath, or for any other wrong purpose, is evil.

Most modern newspapers are un-Christian in their attitude because they are not healers of immorality, but instead are only scandal mongers. The newspapers usually love to pickle gossip or to spice up scandals in order to sell their papers to gossip-loving people

and satisfy their degraded taste.

Whenever you talk against another person for the love of gossip or in order to satisfy your talkative instinct, remember, you will be judged by your Heavenly Father in the same way, for whatever you give out, the same will you attract. If you peddle the weaknesses of others, the Divine Law will mysteriously bring about the publicity

of your own inner faults.

Gossip, either for pleasure or through force of habit, never heals the person talked about; it only ruffles him, makes him mad, steeped in despair, ashamed, and strengthens his determination to continue to be evil. There is a proverb which says: "The one who has lost one ear goes through the village at the side, showing the villagers his best ear, and hiding the lost ear. But he who has lost both ears, goes through the center of the village, because he cannot hide from anyone."

Any person whose moral errors are unduly exposed, becomes desperate and shameless, like the man who lost both ears, and thus he makes no effort to be better. That is why you must not judge with an evil intention or judge in a way to harm the person judged.

"Judge ye not others; judge yourself." If you happen to love to talk loudly about the faults of others, then satisfy that lust by loudly talking about your own private secret faults, and see how you like it even for a minute. Now, if you cannot stand one minute's publicity about your own faults, then you must not in any way rejoice in exposing others.

Besides, the evil you tell about others becomes exaggerated and people are ready to crucify the condemned person without judging the circumstances which led him to be morally weak. To talk about the secret faults of others, is to make them lose the desire to be good. Of course, in rare cases, the fear of publicity keeps some people good, but publicity about a person's fault makes him desperate and makes him lose the desire to be good. Also, a little weakness in a person, through publicity, often becomes big and universally known, whereas people with far greater weaknesses, because of not being detected, go unchecked.

If there is plenty of mental dirt in your own inner home, get busy and clean it out and do not waste time in talking about the mental dirt existing in others. Those who are self-elected critics, and who judge others, are the ones who usually forget to scrutinize their own inner weaknesses. They think that they are all right because they can perceive the faults of others. Do not hide behind such an erroneous mental smoke screen. Unless you are free from fault yourself, you have no right to waste your time in telling others how to be free from the self-same faults which haunt you.

Why behold the mote in your brother's eye if the same trouble exists in you? Before you aspire to take the mote from your brother's eye, you should first take it out of your own eye. If you want to make others moral, you must remove all immorality from your own life. Jesus knew that some immoral people are extremely weak in flesh, though mentally they want very much to get rid of their moral weakness. Jesus said to help such helpless mentally sick people by wisdom and love instead of increasing their troubles by unkind carping criticism.

ESUS' great desire, as was explained in the last number, was to be held not as a God-man, but as a brother to all men.

Humanly speaking, he was tempted and tried, suffering the same crosses with which each and every soul is harassed, nor was he possessed of a fairy wand that easily made him the master of his trials.

His only weapons were the spiritual truths which he clearly understood and which were knit into the very fiber of his being. He was convinced of their reality, and because of their reality he proved their efficacy for all human ills for, as has been said, "Truth is mighty to the tearing down of all strongholds of error." I—RACIALISM.

ISTORY may adequately be defined as the story of the adjustment of the relations between man and man. From time immemorial, the gregarious instinct has bound men into a society designed to promote the interests of the group. From the time when primitive men formed the hunting pack to modern intricate social organizations, we see man, as it were, groping in the dark in his attempt to adjust himself to the rest of his fellows. The way is sodden with blood, and foggy with the smoke of cannon, the din of which seems to echo and re-echo through the ages in mournful reverberations. Notwithstanding the material progress which man has made, there still lingers in him something of the spirit which Hobbes attributes to the State of Nature. Mutual fears, mutual suspicions, mutual hatreds-these are the forces which have banded men into hostile groups since the beginning of time. Based on these foundations, since the cannon balls of Napoleon Bonaparte roared at the gates of Madrid, Moscow, Berlin, Vienna and Rome, have emerged the nations of Europe. As might have been expected from the very nature of their foundation, they have developed a parochial spirit, incapable of transcending the barriers of national prejudices into that land wherein the human race is one.

Yet with all the defects which characterize it, nationalism, or better still, nationality, has its good points. It has formed a unit around which man has been enabled to express his highest self. Potentially, it is the stepping-stone to internationalism. But there has appeared of late years a veritable Gorgon, a hydra-headed monster, which threatens humanity with utter destruction. Racialism, while it contains all the evils of nationalism, has none of its redeeming features.

Despite the barriers which they erect against one another, the Nations of Europe realize their essential oneness and equality. A nation which has more deadly weapons than another is regarded merely as a primus inter pares. Not so with races. Nowadays we are told that the greatest trust to civilization is the continued domination of the Nordic race "with its capacity for leadership and fighting." By virtue of their innate superiority, the white races must be judge and jury all in one, in the affairs of the yellow races, which are doomed to labor eternally under the stigma of inferiority. Modern scientific knowledge

Wear Hat in Sun

SCIENTISTS are unanimous in advocating sunlight as the greatest curative power in the world. Children and adults should take frequent sun baths. The power of the sun's rays attacks and destroys disease germs, stimulates the blood corpuscles, and benefits the human system in many ways.

At the same time, scientists are equally agreed that sunlight pouring the actinic rays upon the brain is extremely dangerous, and especially so for all children and for those adults who have fair hair and complexions. The actinic rays bombard the skull with a sort of microscopic shrapnel, penetrating the brain and injuring that organ's tissues.

In Africa, where the sun's rays are the most powerful, the natives have developed extremely thick and oily black hair and black skin, and these in a measure protect them from the harmful influence of the actinic rays. However, this protection is not complete, so we find that the Africans, even with their black hair, allow it to grow long and pile it up on the head, mixed with tallow or other heavy grease, as a protection against sunlight.

For the above reasons, the present fashion of going bareheaded during the daytime, under the mistaken idea that it is good for the hair and for the general health, is an extremely harmful procedure. When out-of-doors, a hat should be worn, and it should not come off until the sun goes down.

Heart Disease in Youth

BOYS and girls who stay up late at night, drinking and smoking and carrying on, are likely to come down with heart disease. Dr. Howard B. Sprague, of the Massachusetts General Hospital, Boston, made that statement before the American Heart Association.

"Coronary heart disease," he said, "is increasing among the youth of today as a result of the faster tempo of the life they are leading."

The apparent increase in other forms of heart disease, he said, "is really due to the longer life periods of human beings as a result of modern advances in medicine."

He warned against taking exercise "in leaps and bounds."

"It is foolish," he added, "to play 36 holes of golf one day and then wait three months before going to the course again. If unused to exercise, the individual should not take on a program too heavy for his abilities. There is, however, no such thing as athlete's heart. What is generally referred to as athlete's heart is really a nervous disorder which causes the heart to beat more quickly."

You Can't Live For Yourself Alone

Methuselah, who, the Bible tells us, lived to the ripe old age of 969 years, must have been an old bore, Rt. Rev. George Craig Stewart, Protestant Episcopal bishop of Chicago, told a meeting of Rotarians recently.

"What did he do?" the bishop asked. "He probably sat around boasting of how old he was. The Bible tells us he begat Lamech—not much to show for a sojourn of his years on earth."

In order to "live all your life," Bishop Stewart said, you must accomplish something. He said it was not so many years that matter, but the way a person spent those years.

"No one has begun to live until he has given his life to some Cause," he said. "One can't live for himself alone. The proper spirit should be 'forget me; watch the team.'"

DINNER MENU

Melon cocktail
Cold tomato soup
Stuffed cucumber salad
Baked wax beans
Corn on cob
Baked peppers with cheese stuffing
Lemon or lime ice cream
Ora-mint tea or coffee substitute

COLD TOMATO SOUP.

1 can or 1 lb. ripe tomatoes

1 bay leaf

1 onion, chopped

2 cloves

1 peppercorn

1 teaspoon whole wheat flour

1/8 teaspoon ginger

1 cup sour cream

1 hard-cooked egg

3 cups water

Combine tomatoes, bay leaf, onion, seasoning and water, simmer for 25 minutes and strain. Mix the flour with a little cold water and add to tomato liquid. Cook one minute more and then cool. Chill soup thoroughly in refrigerator and serve with 2 tablespoons of sour cream and 1 slice of hard-cooked egg in each plate.

STUFFED CUCUMBER SALAD.

3 cucumbers

2 ripe tomatoes mayonnaise

1/2 cup chopped celery

1 tablespoon chopped onion mineralized salt

Cut chilled cucumbers in halves lengthwise and remove pulp. Cut tomatoes in cubes, drain and mix with cucumber pulp. Add celery, onion and salt and moisten with mayonnaise. Fill cucumber boats with mixture and arrange on romaine lettuce. Garnish with mayonnaise and parsley or cress.

LEMON OR LIME ICE CREAM

½ cup raw sugar

½ cup honey

2 eggs

1½ cups milk

1/4 cup lemon or lime juice

1 teaspoon grated lemon rind

1 cup cream, whipped

Beat eggs thoroughly. Add sugar gradually and continue beating. Then add other ingredients, except the cream. Pour into freezing tray of artificial refrigerator and when almost firm remove to a chilled bowl and beat until light and creamy. Fold in whipped cream. Return to tray and finish freezing. Stir once after half an hour. An ordinary freezer may be used if more convenient.

HEALTH

Hydrogen is another element which is absolutely necessary to the body. It is required for its activity in the processes of elimination, perspiration, salivation, blood circulation and digestion. It helps to prevent inflamation and acts as a solvent in all physiological functions of the body. "Without hydrogen, there would be no elimination, no perspiration, no salivation, no procreation, no growth, no circulation of blood and no digestion."

DIET.

Some hydrogen is contained in all natural foods. The best hydrogen foods are lemons, limes, grapefruit, oranges, fresh pineapples and peaches, all fruit juices, liquids, vegetable juices and water.

BAKED WAX BEANS.

Wash fresh young beans and cut in two lengthwise. Put them in a casserole, sprinkle with mineralized salt and smolin (smoked seasoning), add a little boiling water. Cover and bake until tender. Season generously with melted butter and serve.

is invoked to establish the fundamental superiority of the white races—Biology, Anthropology, Psychology and the rest of that grim band which seems destined to effect the euthanasia of the human kind.

II—CAUSES OF RACIAL ANTAGONISM

Before we attempt to avert the danger to humanity, we must diagnose its causes:

1. Economic

The initial settlement of the continents of Asia, Africa and America by Europeans was mainly due to economic considerations. These countries being undeveloped afforded vast fields for exploitation. The Europeans fought and annihilated or subjugated the original inhabitants of these countries. Where the aborigines persisted, they were turned into the hewers of wood and drawers of water for the white man. Hence arose the anomaly of White Capital and Colored Labor which has far-reaching psyschological effects. The relation of white and colored became that of master and servant. In South Africa, for instance, there are types of work which are labelled "Kaffir jobs," which it is infra dig for any white man to discharge. Laws detrimental to the progress of the non-Europeans have been passed to bolster up the economic interests of the white man. The educated non-European smarts and chafes under these restrictions which have for their basis color, not ability; and is finally turned into an agitator.

The effective Westernization of Japan has tended to elicit the suspicion of Europe and America, who feel the pinch of economic competition. In several countries economic barriers have been set up against Japan, where goods are produced comparatively cheaply. Consequently a vague sense of impending danger from the Far East resulting in hatred for the Japanese as individuals,

is preying upon the public mind of the West.

Barriers which meet the public approbation have been set up against Japanese and other Oriental immigration in Anglo-Saxon communities. Similarly, the wholesale expatriation of Jews from Germany, including such a benefactor of humanity as Dr. Einstein, can be traced to economic causes.

2. Political

On the moral principle of trusteeship for their backward neighbors, the conquering and resident European Communities generally assumed the sole political direction of the destinies of state in their new homes. But this trusteeship has of late years been interpreted to mean permanent tutelage amounting to servility on the part of the na-Modern democracy gives each able and qualified citizen a say in the administration of the state by means of the vote. Its criterion is ability and achievement, not skin pigmentation. But the governing white communities are loath to extend the franchise to deserving natives. As I write, the South African government is in a turmoil regarding the advisability of retaining or abrogating the native vote. Owing to the fear of the "Black Menace" an unnecessary conflict has been created between the principles of democracy and trusteeship.

India is at present making insistent efforts to free herself from the apronstrings of the British government, and to become mistress in her own house. It seems she will eventually reach the goal of her endeavors. If so, it will be after a hard fight in which racialism has been rampant.

3. Social

Dominant European communities have created social barriers against their colored neighbors. Intercourse between the various groups is assiduously discouraged. In South Africa, for instance, Europeans and non-Europeans cannot dine in the same restaurants, nor can they rub shoulders in trains. Public halls and public libraries are the exclusive monopoly of the whites. Miscegination is strictly forbidden by law. A powerful section of the Europeans advocates territorial segregation. Needless

to say, this lack of contact has resulted in a profound ignorance of each other on the part of the racial groups—an ignorance which intensifies racial ill-feeling.

4. Psychological

Economic, political and social discriminations have produced a superiority complex in the European, who scorns equality of treatment with the non-Europeans. Hence legislation which represses the non-European as a class generally elicits no disapprobation from the white public. Especially is this so when scientific knowledge is exploited to prove the inborn cultural and mental superiority of the Europeans.

III—HARMONIZING RACIAL RELATIONS

How should we develop cooperative and harmonious relations among the races of the earth?

- 1. We must convince public opinion that there is no inherent difference between the various classes of humanity. Noticeable differences are largely environmental, not biological. The world must learn to appreciate the similarities and not to exaggerate the dissimilarities of the human kind. We can achieve our goal by:
- (a) Employing properly qualified persons to expose through the radio, the press and public platforms the falsity of the claim for racial discriminations on scientific authority.
- (b) Carefully examining Intelligence Tests, so as to eliminate insofar as possible all traditional and environmental influences.
- 2. We must divorce the racial element from economics. Public opinion must be moulded to abhor any legislation which gives an economic bias to one racial group. Barriers to free trade must be razed to the ground. The distribution of the products of industry must be delegated to an international cooperative organization, the watchword of which will be "Each according to his ability; to each according to his needs." All races and classes must be taught the dignity of labor; and any legislation which is calculated to associate a certain type of work with one racial group and

not with another must be erased from the statute books. The economic interdependence of races and nations must be preached, and all forces which tend isolate man from man must be strenuously opposed.

- 3. The principle of political equality for all races must be established. Citizenship must be determined not by color, but by education and ability. This standard will ensure that the destinies of state are entrusted to the best minds, whose chief aim will be to maintain a high degree of civilization. All dictatorships, or governments, the administration of which depend on one man or one group of men, must be curtailed in order to make certain that individual rights shall be preserved. Democracy must be purged of all rationalizations which justify different treatment of races as such.
- 4. A revolutionary reconstruction of the social relations between white and colored will be necessary. All social barriers must be nullified. Theories which preach racial purity merely on sentimental grounds must be exploded. Love usually defies physical characteristics. No artificial obstacles, therefore, must be thrown athwart its path. Intermarriage must positively be encouraged. Cultural variations are accidents of environment. They are superficial when compared with the fundamental unity of the human race.
- 5. All forces which tend to perpetuate a racial psychology must be eliminated. Statements which aim at intensifying racialism must be publicly de-nounced. All books and films which preach racial domination must be boycotted; and those which demonstrate the advantages of cooperative action must receive a wide circulation. Competitions must be arranged for the entire world. and prizes given for those essays, novels. dramas, etc., which reflect human beings irrespective of their color, strutting and fretting their hour on the stage of life and getting along together usefully and happily. Pen-friendships, such as conceived by The New History Society of New York, must be encouraged between the youth of different countries and colors. Where possible actual contacts between pen-friends should be fostered.

For this purpose governments should be persuaded to facilitate communications between various races and nations. Each government should create a special "Department for Promoting International and Inter-racial Contacts." In consultation with similar departments of other countries, expeditions composed of the educated youth could be sent at cheap cost to all parts of the world.

6. More use than heretofore might be made of the institutions with the principles of which racialism is at vari-

ance:

RELIGION: Christianity has had a profound influence for good in human relations; but hitherto it has often wavered in order to accommodate sectional propensities. The failure of European Christians to unite in opposition to the Great War revealed the fact that there were loyalties which exacted stronger demands than those of religion. Racial domination is sometimes justified as the ordination of God, and the curse of Ham is brought to witness. It is incumbent on youth to break the fetters of tradition and to unite in creating a universal religion, in which all men are sons and daughters of the living God. Religion shall then not remain merely a personal thing. It shall be a living force adjusting the everyday relationships of men.

(b) UNIVERSITIES AND COL-LEGES should be open to all, irrespective of color. Social contacts, including common accommodation, and common sports grounds between the racial groups should be the rule. Subjects like History, Sociology, Psychology, etc., should be taught with a view to discovering the essential unity of mankind rather than its stratifications. All people must receive a sound education.

(c) INTER - RACIAL COMMITTEES, such as the "Joint Council" in South Africa, must be encouraged. Their scope must be widened to embrace all spheres of activity.

IV—THE CREATORS OF HARMONY

For the work of reconstruction nothing short of the enthusiasm of youth is necessary. That force that has always made it foremost in battle, must now be sublimated to nobler purposes. Having thrown aside the fetters of dead tradition, youth must unite, organize and achieve. There should be a central and controlling Executive, clear in its principles, which should scatter these noble seeds through branches planted all over the globe. Its watchword will be "Mankind is one big family," and its slogan "No more war." Its policy must be destructive and constructive, revolutionary and evolutionary. Youth will have to be bold and venturesome, not in war this time, but in the adventure of pacifying the world, which has an infinite store of fascinations and allurements. Youth! The future happiness of humanity depends on you. Strike now! Undaunted by the threatening bombshells of bloodthirsty governments, go forthwith about your business, which is no less than to create a new humanity . . . "The Universal Community of the Loyal."

wholesale death by poison gases rained from the skies. Probably mankind's next greatest fear is of the suffering of cancer. But both the fear of poison gas and the fear of cancer may be cast entirely out of conscious knowledge by the unfoldment of those harmonious laws which govern the frequency of vibration of that which we call energy and light.

There is an absolute oneness of harmonious continuity of the laws governing the physical world and the realm of the spiritual. The laws of the universe are one.

Harmonious activity under these laws betokens, besides absolute fearlessness, also absolute precision and accuracy, musical rhythmical perfection and thereby Perfect Peace, both within the inner Consciousness and in its relation to the outer environment.

News From India

EXCERPTS FROM A LETTER OF C. RICHARD WRIGHT

Royal Hotel, Bombay, India, June 2, 1936.

Sorry that time does not permit my long tale of our terrific motor journey from Delhi to Bombay along the edge of the vast Rajputana Desert—but that must await our return, as must many other anecdotes.

At the present moment I am relaxing in the more moderate climate of Bombay, not relaxing exactly, for I am arranging a three-day campaign in Bombay, while Swamiji has returned to Calcutta.

Constantly he remarks on the loyalty and devotion of his little nucleus back in America, and it is the cooperation and steadfastness of all in the West that will finally lure him away from the eager clutches of the Eastern devotees. (Wish I could bring home several for companions.)

So, all in all, it is a trifle empty and quiet in Bombay, with Swamiji off in Calcutta, but he will be here in time for his lectures on the 8th, 9th, and 10th of

Bombay is the cleanest and most Westernized city in India, full of activity, both modern and ancient—beautiful buildings of grand architecture with elaborate decorations and trimmings in a setting of shady trees and palms—wide boulevards twist about the island or peninsula on which rests Bombay, and the "Champs Elysees" of Bom-

bay is Queen's Road, which skirts the bay and beach and climbs atop Malabar Hill, where is seen a glorious panorama of Bombay by night, with its multicolored neon-lights and flickering sign-boards and fire-fly auto lights weaving about the maze of streets.

The city proper is a whirlpool of activity, with large department stores, small shops, street peddlars, horsedrawn, four-wheeled buggies (quite dignified), trams with trailers, doubledecker trams, rubber-tired buses, bicycles, and the latest and best automobiles in all India - a progressive city in a retarded India, with much wealth apparent. And Bombay enjoys the best climate of all India's large cities; Calcutta at 105 degrees, Delhi at 109 degrees; Lahore at 115 degrees, Benares at 107 degrees, with Bombay at 97 degrees, and the monsoon is expected to burst here next week, and then things will be cooler, and, of course, wetter. But India suffers greatly just before the monsoon, but is somewhat more bearable thereafter. All in all, Bombay is rather appealing in its way, and the same is true of all Indian cities-in their own way they attract.

Well, the blue of the night has settled about us, with a fresh sea zephyr kissing the leaves and cavorting in our room in ecstasy under the fan, so there is not much else to do but pray that you are all well, and assure you that we are the same.

I disconnected the rays of my mind from the little territory of the senses and switched them on in the land of the Infinite. The aurora of my attention spread in all directions, embracing Infinity.

Ordinarily our thoughts are veiled behind our flesh and appearances, but when I delved into the Infinite I stood in the land unveiled and found the streams of rushing, glistening thoughts. I felt the rippling thoughts of millenniums, born and unborn civilizations. All futurity danced in me the Infinite Rhythm.

BAKED PEPPERS WITH CHEESE STUFFING

3 large green peppers

1 cup cooked brown rice

1 cup whole wheat bread crumbs

½ cup grated American cheese

1 tablespoon chopped onions 1 tablespoon chopped celery 1/2 teaspoon mineralized salt

1 egg

3 tablespoons butter

Wash peppers, cut slice off top, and remove and discard seeds and pulp. Mix other ingredients and stuff peppers. Stand them in a small pan. Pour ½ inch of water in pan and bake in a moderate oven for 30 minutes. Baste several times.


